QUESTIONS FOR HOME-ARP CONSULTATION MEETINGS

QUALIFYING POPULATIONS UNDER HOME-ARP

- Households experiencing homelessness
- Households at risk of homelessness
- Households fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking
- Households requiring services or housing assistance to prevent homelessness, including but not limited to people with disabilities
- Households with the greatest risk of housing instability
- Households with a Veteran family member who belongs to one of the qualifying populations

QUESTIONS FOR ADVOCACY GROUPS, ORGANIZATIONS, AND SERVICE PROVIDERS

- Please describe your/your organization's connection to the above qualifying populations, as applicable. (See "Qualifying Populations . . . " list above.)
- Please describe the size and demographics of the qualifying populations within your community based upon your experience.
 - Who is experiencing the most significant need?
 - Who is most at risk?
 - How difficult is it for them today?
- What are the greatest needs for the qualifying populations? Consider shelter, housing, and service needs.
- Where are the <u>unmet</u> shelter, housing, and service needs?
 - Where are the gaps within the current shelter and housing inventory and service delivery system?
 - What housing, shelter, or service gaps more profoundly impact people with disabilities?
 - Do any housing, shelter, or service gaps highlight equity issues within the context of civil rights and fair housing?
- What characteristics of the community's housing market are barriers for the qualifying populations? Please include information about housing quality, vacancy rates, barriers to using rental assistance, and issues concerning civil rights, fair housing, and accessibility.



QUESTIONS FOR HOME-ARP CONSULTATION MEETINGS

- What existing and anticipated resources are available in the community to meet these high-priority needs?
- What shelter, housing, or service activities does the City/Town provide for qualifying populations that work well? That do not work well?
- Of the eligible HOME-ARP activities discussed during this interview, which do you think make the most sense for the WestMetro HOME Consortium to prioritize? Why?

REQUESTS

- IF APPLICABLE: Can you share data regarding the size and composition of the qualifying populations within your community, including the data you collect and report on? This may include annual reports, strategic plans, or similar materials, which may provide helpful framing about the services provided, program outcomes, and long-term community plans or goals.
 - Are there recent surveys or other sources of information available that could provide perspective from people in the qualifying populations you work with?





HOME-ARP HIGHLIGHTS

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HOME-ARP Overview

- HOME-ARP: \$5 billion for housing and homeless assistance awarded to HOME participating jurisdictions (PJs)
- PJs must submit an Allocation Plan to HUD to receive funds. Allocation Plan must include:
 - Consultation and public participation process
 - Needs Assessment and Gap Analysis
 - Proposed allocation of funds across eligible activities
 - And more!
- WestMetro HOME Consortium: **\$5,406,962**

Qualifying populations (eligible beneficiaries), defined in HUD guidelines:

1. Homeless

Qualifying Populations

- 2. At risk of homelessness
- 3. Fleeing domestic/dating violence, sexual assault, human trafficking
- 4. Households with severe housing instability (limitations apply)
- 5. Veterans if eligible under 1-4 above

Eligible Activities

(some funding caps apply)

- Rental Housing: Acquisition, Construction, and Rehab
- TBRA
- Supportive Services: McKinney-Vento; Homelessness Prevention; Housing Counseling
- Non-Congregate Shelters: Acquisition, Construction, Rehab
- Operating Assistance & Capacity Building
- Administration & Planning: To develop the HOME-ARP Plan and administer grant

Planning Considerations

- Small, <u>one-time</u> allocation
- Need far surpasses what available funds can address
- Timely expenditure requirements
 - Sept 30, 2030
- State HOME-ARP Plan underway
- Fair housing and equity


DEFINITION OVERVIEW (See CPD 21-10 for more detail)

- An individual or family who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, **OR**
- An individual or family who will imminently lose their primary nighttime • residence, OR
- Unaccompanied youth under 25 years of age, or families with children and youth \bullet who do not otherwise qualify as homeless under this definition but are defined as homeless under other federal programs **AND** meet other program requirements.

PRIMARY DATA SOURCE: Continuum of Care

- **Continuum of Care:** regional or local planning body that coordinates housing and services funding for homeless families and individuals.
- There are 12 CoCs in MA eligible to apply for money from HUD.
- Each CoC serves a unique geographic area and reports homelessness statistics annually.
- The WestMetro HOME Consortium is within the **Balance of State CoC**





- PIT counts include:
 - unsheltered homeless
 - emergency shelters (family, individual, and domestic violence shelters)
 - emergency shelter motel voucher
 - transitional housing

Qualifying Population: At Risk of Homelessness

DEFINITION OVERVIEW (See CPD 21-10 for more detail)

- An individual or family who has an annual income below 30 percent of median family income for the area, as determined by HUD <u>AND</u>
 - Has limited support systems, <u>AND</u>
 - Meets other program requirements
- A child or youth who does not qualify as "homeless" under this section but qualifies as "homeless" under other federal programs.

Qualifying Population: Fleeing, or Attempting to Flee, Domestic Violence, Dating Violence, Sexual Assault, Stalking, or Human Trafficking



DEFINITION OVERVIEW

(See CPD 21-10 for more detail)

- Domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking are defined in 24 CFR 5.2003 (HUD program requirements relating to protection of these vulnerable populations).
- Human Trafficking includes both sex and labor trafficking, as outlined in the Trafficking Victims Protection Act of 2000 (TVPA), as amended (22 U.S.C. 7102).

Qualifying Population: Other Populations

DEFINITION OVERVIEW (See CPD 21-10 for more detail)

- Households who have previously been "homeless" and are currently housed due to temporary or emergency assistance.
- Households who either:
 - have annual income ≤ 30% of area median income <u>AND</u> are severely housing cost burdened, OR
 - have annual income ≤ 50% of area median income <u>AND</u> meet other program requirements for being at risk of homelessness.


