




# Newton Rotary Club A Community Resource

### Charter Night For the Newton Rotary Club

- November 20, 2023, at the Woodland Golf Club
- Over 200 Rotarians & Rotary Anns attended
- Many the Melrose, Quincy, Lynn and Salem clubs
- First Board meeting was held on May 4, 1923
- William T. Halliway- First President Treasurer of the Newton Trust Co.
- At an early meeting- President was directed to write a letter to the Newton Welfare Bureau endorsing the sale of Health Stamps.
- Regular meetings held at the old Newton Club on Walnut St
  - Charge for membership \$1.25 ( .\$75/meal, .\$25 for the Newton Club and .\$25 for Newton Rotary).
- Outings included visits to Mashbee Island on Buzzards Bay and Ladies Nights – Luncheons were moved to Normandie Restaurant at Norumbega Park.



# **Precedent Was Established**



In 1923 – a Boys Work Committee was formed – main charter – Financial assistance in the form of Scholarships (\$300 scholarship was established. Over the years — students representing \$. — .



In 1925 -Voted to not pay for any speakers at weekly meetings



In 1926 -Club changed from a calendar year to our present July 1 to June 30<sup>th</sup> (fiscal year) First Club President – Bill Halliday was sent to the Rotary International Convention in St Louis & subsequently (1936) established a Rotary International Convention Fund (used to defray President's expenses in attending the convention).



In 1926 – Board of Directors authorized the Treasurer to bill each member in advance for luncheons and dues



# Early Years of the Club – the Community Service Function

### Financial Assistance was Provided for:

- Medical Treatment for a Polio Victim
- Newton Welfare Bureau Christmas Program
- Newton High School Musicale
- Summer Camperships for Boys Scouts of the Peabody Home
- Newton Scouts attending the Boy Scout Jamboree
- The purchase of a wooden leg for a young Newton Boy
- The payment of rent for a family where the wage earner was unemployed.

Newton Rotary sponsored the following clubs:

Rotary Club of Newton RotaryNewton.org

Concord in 1931
Brookline in 1938
Wellesley in 1946 and in conjunction with Brookline in 1966, co-sponsored Chestnut Hill Club

Only took six years to repay the Boston Club for its Sponsorship




# Signs of the Times seen in the Club's History

- In 1930 Mayor of Newton (Sinclair Weeks) asks Rotary to form committee to fight unemployment.
- Ladies night postponed to use funds to hire a man from the unemployment Bureau at City Hall.
- Christmas party gifts of 10¢ was wrapped in \$1 given to the chairman of the Rotary Club Unemployment Committee for distribution.
- Forest fire burnt out Nobscot area- financial assistance by the Rotary club = planting of 3900 new trees at this scout camp.
- At its 450<sup>th</sup> meeting achieved 100% attendance in 1931.
- In 1933, the Rotary International Convention was held in Boston Newton Rotarians staffed the reception & Hospitality committees & supplied cars and drivers donated by club
- In 1933, the club formally approved a declaration supporting Pres. FDR program to lift the country out of depression




